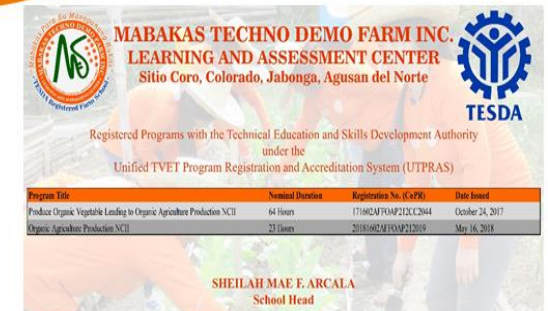

History

- Established in the late 2016
- Name derived from the Mamanwa word for “industrious”
- Mabakas evolved into a certified learning site in 2018 then to an Organic Farm school and Assessment Center in 2019

COVID-19 Interventions through Mabakas



Early response to COVID-19 food crisis. Agata is one of the earliest responders who aided the community in securing food amidst COVID-related threats to food security.

For the Communities

- On the onset, Agata distributed canned goods, noodles and rice packs
- Also distributed packs of vegetables produced by Mabakas farm school students in order to address proper nutrition among beneficiaries

For the farmers

- Contents of relief packs were sourced from local farmers
- It provided farmers with an alternative market for their produce

Agata Interventions

For Fisherfolks

- Agata's Pump and Paddle Boat Project for the Fisherfolks in coastal barangays
- Provided pump boat motors and paddle boats to help sustain their traditional livelihood
- Today, the steady supply of fish helps sustain the prices of the commodity in their locality



A helping hand. The company helped the fisherfolks by realigning projects to support COVID-19 relief operations through its Community Relations Office.

Agata Interventions

For Livestock Farmers

- Transport restrictions during the pandemic were a big challenge to community hog raisers
- Agata bought their livestock and distributed these to beneficiary communities, which helped sustain their livelihood



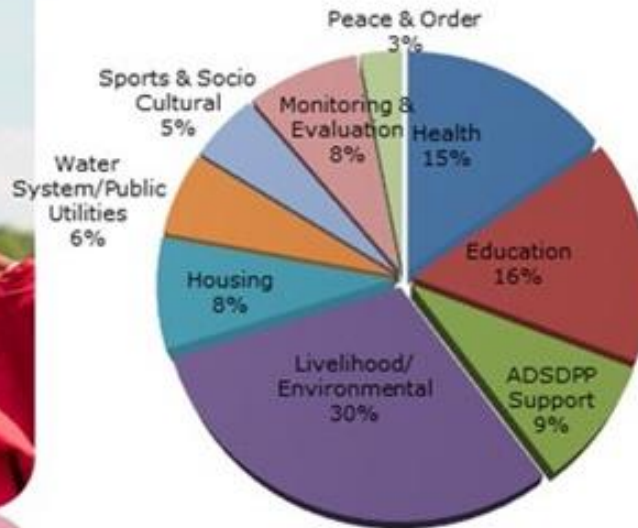
Agata creates opportunities. Agata initiated alternative ways of helping hog raisers sell their products by buying and distributing their livestock as part of its COVID-19 relief.

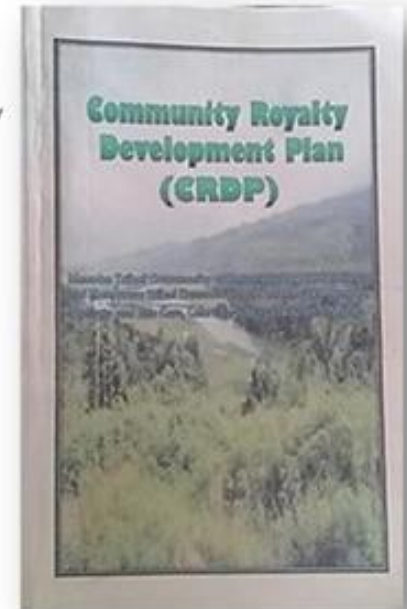
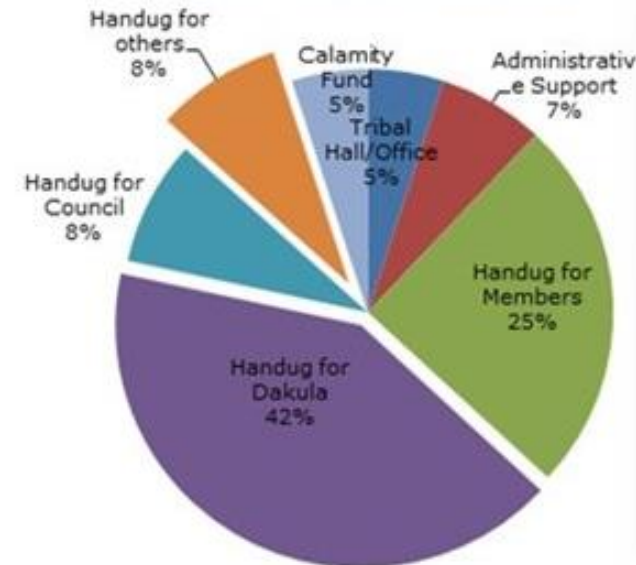

IP Royalty and Community Royalty Development Plan

- Agata's SDMP is harmonized with the company's engagement with its Indigenous hosts through the Community Royalty Development Plan (CRDP)
- CRDP guarantees the proper allocation of Royalty share received by the Mamanwa Ancestral Domain Management Organization (MADMO) into efficient and sustainable livelihood
- Royalty expenditures are divided equally between Governance (50%) and Community Development Projects (50%)
